COMMUNITY DIVERSION PROGRAM

A pre-filing diversion program offered once exclusively for

first-time offenders facing a low-level property or drug felony.

DATA CONFIRMS THAT CONVICTION OF A FIRST FELONY IS A TIPPING POINT WHICH OFTEN RESULTS IN OFFENDERS COMMITTING MANY MORE FELONIES

The key is to intervene before that first felony conviction

COLLATERAL CONSEQUENCES OF A FIRST FELONY

- Occupation / licensing restrictions
- Housing restrictions
- Education / scholarship restrictions
- Welfare implications

TYPICAL CASE-FLOW FOR OFFENDER FACING FIRST LOW-LEVEL PROPERTY/DRUG FELONY

- Charges filed
- Counsel assigned
- Bail addressed
- Multiple hearings over several months (often resulting in warrants, leading to more arrests and costly jail bookings)
- Case ultimately resolves often with a plea to reduced charges
- Sentencing occurs months or years after the crime typically to time served
- Restitution ordered, but is paid in small increments over several years <u>if at all</u>
- In total: multiple hearings, delay, system expenditures, limited accountability

ENVISIONING BETTER OUTCOMES FOR FIRST LOW-LEVEL PROPERTY / DRUG FELONY

- Victims of property crimes will be made whole up front.
- People will be held accountable in days, not months or years.
- Hundreds of costly warrants will be eliminated annually.
- Community-based, culturally competent services will be offered to reduce recidivism.
- Offenders will avoid the collateral consequences of their first felony conviction while still being held accountable for the harm they caused.
- Uniquely tailored services will be offered to offenders under 25.

What if we can do all of the above for less cost than the current system?

ELIGIBLE OFFENSES

INELIGIBLE OFFENSES

- Many Property Offenses
- Many Drug Offenses

- Crimes against persons
- Violent Crimes
- Domestic Violence
- Sexual assault
- Weapon offenses
- Any case with concerning facts/history (DV history, LE concerns, multiple offenses, significant restitution, etc.)

COMMUNITY-BASED PRE-FILING DIVERSION


 From the savings, the county will employ a program manager/navigator who can assess risks and needs and connect individuals to culturally competent communitybased, pre-filing diversion programs, where they must acknowledge the harm caused by their actions, and be held accountable by engaging in services and programs tailored to their needs. For offenders 18-24 there will be services uniquely designed for young adults.

VICTIM'S RESTORATION FUND

• From the savings captured there will be a Victim's Restoration Fund established, which will enable victims to submit proof of their out of pocket expenses and be reimbursed <u>up front</u>. They will not need to wait till the end of a lengthy court case or be subjected to piecemeal payments months or years later.

CASE FLOW FOR COMMUNITY DIVERSION

- Police submit low-level property / drug offense to Prosecutor
- Experienced DPA reviews and screens for eligibility (eliminating repeat offenders, reviewing criminal history, facts alleged, nature of the charges, police input)
- Victims contacted to assess needs and coordinate payment from a Victim Restoration Fund
- Eligible offenders are evaluated by the county navigator and directed to a culturally relevant community-based program to address needs <u>&</u> acknowledge harm caused by their actions
- If individual fails to engage, or commits a new offense, the facilitator will contact the prosecutor who reserves the right to file the original charge within the statute of limitations.



POTENTIAL ANNUAL SAVINGS

- Reduced use of county legal services
- Reduced use of jail (for bookings, sentences, re-bookings upon failure to appear)
- Reduced use of court costs
- Reduced warrants / Failure to Appear costs
- Reduced use of pre-trial services (CCAP)
- Reduced use of police resources for discovery requests, court appearances
- Avoids declining cases to overburdened municipal courts

THE RESULT

- Victims will be made whole <u>up front</u>
- Individuals will be given a chance to avoid a first low-level property/drug felony – and thereby avoid the collateral consequences – <u>preventing the</u> <u>cycle of recidivism</u>
- Cases will be addressed much more <u>quickly</u>
- Community partners will engage in the Pre-Filing Diversion Program
- Racial disproportionality (most affecting 18-24 year old's) will be diminished
- County, police, cities, will all save money <u>annually</u>.
